Attention! You are now leaving your Comfort Zone!

I will be talking about why I believe it can be useful to think consciously about what your own professional comfort zone is and I'll be explaining from my own experience some of the positives we can take from suddenly going beyond, or extending, our comfort zone. I will also be sharing some practical tips and activities that have helped me to cope better with the sudden, dramatic shift to teaching teenagers online.

Physically-distanced teaching tips - boosting children's engagement with English



As children move between online and face-to-face English learning, teachers need to keep their motivation high, make lessons enjoyable and provide lots of interaction. This is especially challenging when maintaining physical distances between the learners in the classroom. This session will share lively ideas to appeal to children's curiosity, foster a love of English and provide plenty of communication opportunities. All of the activities and techniques demonstrated during the session can be used in the primary English classroom while still keeping a safe distance.
